

# **Producer Grants**

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#### Introduction

Each year, a number of state and federal agencies, as well as private organizations, make grants of varying amounts available to individual commercial growers, grower organizations, and farm-related businesses. These are generally competitive grants, meaning growers must not only meet specific qualifications, but they are also competing with other applicants for limited funds. Grants, unlike loans, do not have to be repaid; however, they are not "free money." Organizations offering grant programs have a specific purpose they are working to achieve. Grants are awarded for a variety of reasons including testing innovative ideas and research techniques, conducting field trials, onfarm demonstrations and market research, and promoting economic growth and diversification. Whether the project involves crop production practices or product development, results often must benefit multiple growers, not just the applicant. In general, the applicant must create a project plan, implement the plan, maintain detailed records, and then report on the results. Granting organizations reporting requirements vary depending on the stipulations of the grant.

This fact sheet discusses tips for obtaining a producer grant and provides a selective listing of some organizations that offer grants to Kentucky growers.

# **Choose your project**

Although some programs allow projects to benefit only one farm, others require that the project benefit a number of growers. Select a project that is within your capabilities in terms of available time, experience and finances; many grants require DIVERSI cash or in-kind match and will not cover



100 percent of the projected expenses. Some grant and cost-share benefits are taxable. The complexity of the project must also fit the amount of money requested.

# Finding grants

There are many resources available to help farmers and agribusinesses find funding resources in Kentucky. The Kentucky Center for Agriculture and Rural Development (KCARD) offers services that include

The table lists funding organizations and the grants they offer; refer to their websites for specific requirements and deadlines. You can also conduct a general search for grants on the internet using keywords such as "producer grants" or "grower grants." Local agricultural groups and community organizations may offer grants of various amounts. County extension agents may be able to direct you to grants available locally. If you are retired, disabled, a veteran, or have a household income below the poverty level, you may want to seek out grants awarded to qualifying farmers in these specific groups.

KCARD publishes information on relevant grant opportunities for Kentucky agricultural projects on their <u>Facebook page</u>, their website, and through an email list that you can join.

## **Choose the appropriate grant(s)**

Make sure you meet the eligibility requirements and that the project you have in mind qualifies for the grant. Some grant websites will indicate the types of projects that have been funded previously. This can be a good indicator of the types of projects the granting organization wants to fund.

## Plan ahead

The whole grant process, from application to approval, is a slow procedure. The application form can involve considerable writing, as well as the gathering of pertinent supporting documentation. In addition, it may require additional time to fine-tune a research idea or project. The entire application process can take several months. It is critical to meet the grant deadline, so allow plenty of time to complete the application process. Once submitted, the grant is generally reviewed by a committee that will also be considering other proposals. It can take several weeks to months before you know if your grant proposal has been approved.

## Conduct a detailed business plan

Carefully review all the financial requirements of the project you have in mind, as well as sources of income. Grants often do not cover 100 percent of the expenses required for a project. If you do not have the available funds to make up the difference, an additional funding source will be needed.

Grants go to projects that can demonstrate that they

are good investments. You demonstrate this by developing a strong business plan with financial projections. If you need help, KCARD helps producers and agricultural projects develop business plans and these financial projections.

## Locate a technical advisor

Some grants require that the grower work with a technical advisor on the project. However, even if one is not required, it would be beneficial to seek out a technical service provider such as KCARD, an extension agent, crop specialist, or other agricultural professional to serve as a consultant. The advisor should review your proposal to make sure it is sound and be able to provide you with suggestions on improving the project. An advisor is not only useful during the planning stages, but also throughout the course of the project.

## **Application**

Follow the grant application instructions exactly and meet the deadline. Be sure to keep within page or word limits and provide supporting documentation. For example, the Rural Energy for America Program (REAP) requires a letter from the state energy office indicating that the project meets their environmental goals. You will want your proposal to stand out among all the others, so make sure you explain your project and its implications as thoroughly as possible, within the limits of the application requirements. Multiple reviewers can be helpful in this process. If you have any questions or concerns, contact the grant organization for help well in advance of the deadline.
